IMPORTANT CHANGES IN RESIDENTIAL REFUSE/RECYCLING COLLECTION SERVICE



The town has renewed the residential refuse and recycling collection contract with Moody's/AVES and beginning July 1, 2013, changes will be made in the schedule and collection frequency in an effort to better serve resident needs. Please note that for residents in Smithfield's single family neighborhoods this service continues to be provided at no cost or separate fee.

Both refuse and recycling collection will be picked up **once per week**. For residents on the West Side (refuse collection will remain on Monday's and recycling collection will be on Thursdays). For residents on the East Side (refuse collection will remain on Tuesday's and recycling collection will be on Friday's). All residents will be provided a recycling cart before July 1, 2013. For your convenience, a collection schedule has been provided in this newsletter.



We are also pleased to announce that Debris Pickup will be collected for recycling every Wednesday on a call in basis. Residents must call AVES/Moody's one week prior at 757-357-9997 and provide address if they have debris to be collected. There will be a limit to 10 bags and/or bundles per week. Leaves and yard waste must be placed in clear bags and tied and not exceed 35 pounds each. Limbs and other yard waste not placed in clear bags must be tied and bundled and not exceed 3" diameter or 60" in length.

Wednesday's will also be the holiday make-up day for refuse collection only. If recycling falls on a holiday, it will be picked up on your normal schedule the following week. Holiday's reflect the same schedule as Isle of Wight County's transfer station. As always, the refuse and recycling collection holiday schedule will be advertised in The Times as well as on the town website www.smithfieldva.gov.

Please remember AVES/Moody's provides automated service and all refuse and recycling must be placed inside of the cans and lids must be closed. Orange tags will continue to be placed on carts requiring corrective action. If you have any questions about your service, please contact AVES/Moody's at 757-357-9997.

NOTICE TO ALL TOWN RESIDENTS

**TOWN OF SMITHFIELD
SPRING COMMUNITY CLEANUP DAYS**

Moody's/AVES will provide free pick up service for your old furniture, appliances, TV's, stereos, carpets and lawn maintenance equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, etc. (equipment must be free of oil and gas) for Town residents on the following Saturdays:

Date of Service and Area of Town

Saturday, April 20:

All areas north and west of Cypress Creek and the Pagan River (including River Oaks, Pinewood Heights, Goose Hill Creek, Jericho Estates, Cypress Creek, Riverview, Lakeside, Downtown areas, Jersey Park, West Main Street, etc.)

Saturday, April 27:

All areas on the south side of town including both sides of South Church Street and east of Cypress Creek (including Waterford Oaks, Willow Oaks, Aspen Woods, Scots Landing, Pinehurst, Grimesland, etc.)

Saturday, May 4:

All areas east and north of South Church Street and both sides of Battery Park Road (includes Rising Star, Wellington Estates, Moone Plantation, Smithfield Forest, John Rolfe Estates, Croatan Landing, Moonefield, Pagan Point, Red Point Heights, Deer Run, Villas, etc.)

Everything to be picked up must be at the street side **no later than 6:30 AM**. The trucks will not be able to drive into your yard to pick up any items. *Please call Moody's/AVES at 357-9997 with any questions about Spring Clean Up Days.*

****PLEASE NOTE: Moody's/AVES WILL NOT PICK UP YARD DEBRIS OR TREE LIMBS (larger than 3" in diameter or longer than 4 feet) OR STRUCTURAL DEBRIS SUCH AS USED LUMBER, ROOFING, SIDING, ETC. Leaves or other yard trimmings must be bagged. Limbs must be tied and bundled.**

OTHER ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: TIRES, COMPUTERS, PAINTS, BATTERIES, GAS CYLINDERS, OIL, ASBESTOS, ANIMAL CARCASSES AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.



NOTE: If you have household hazardous waste you can dispose of it free of charge at the Isle of Wight Transfer Station, 13191 Foursquare Road, Smithfield on the fourth Saturday of the months of January, April, July and October, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. You may recycle used motor oil at this location. They also take paint, pesticides, antifreeze, fuels, hobby supplies, insecticides, herbicides, paint thinners, solvents, fertilizers, swimming pool chemicals, household batteries and cleaners. You may reach the IOW Transfer Station at 961-3874.

FERTILIZING YOUR YARD

**Stop and think before you fertilize.
You will save yourself time and money all the while saving our local waterways.**

GOOD TO KNOW

Fertilizer contains three nutrients: nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. While these nutrients are needed by plants to grow and survive, too much is ending up in our local waterways via stormwater runoff. When there is too much nitrogen and phosphorus in a waterway, it fuels the growth of algal blooms. Algal blooms are dense clusters of algae that block sunlight from other organisms. When an alga from the bloom dies, the decay process consumes dissolved oxygen in the water, which is needed by fish, blue crabs and other organisms for survival.

GOOD TO DO

- **Have your soil tested before you decide to fertilize.**

A soil test provides a list of recommendations for soil amendments to help you make the right decisions for your lawn.

Fertilizers are described by 3 numbers, such as 12-4-8 or 46-0-0. These 3 numbers indicate, respectively, the percent by weight of nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), and potassium (K) in the fertilizer. The test also indicates the acidity (pH) of your soil and whether lime is needed. A basic soil test does not actually measure the nitrogen present in your soil, it merely provides you with a nitrogen recommendation. You can often use much less than is recommended to get successful results and may not need to use any if you are mulching your grass clippings back onto your lawn. In Hampton Roads, our soil is naturally rich in phosphorus so, with the exception of new plantings, adding phosphorus is often not necessary. Check out this [resource](#) from Lynnhaven River NOW for more information about soil testing.

- **Know your grass**

If your soil test indicates you need to fertilize, make sure you fertilize at the right time of year for your grass.

Cool season grasses

- Ideal for areas that get light shade
- Seed in late summer
- If needed, fertilize in fall
- Mow at higher heights during summer months

Examples of cool season grasses: tall fescue (mow to 2-3"), Fine fescue (mow to 2-3"), Ryegrass (mow to 1½ - 2½")

Warm season grasses

- ideal for areas that get full sun
- Seed in early spring
- If needed, fertilize in spring

Examples of warm season grasses: Zoysiagrass (¾ to 1"), Centipedegrass (mow to 1½"), Bermuda grass (mow ½ - 1")

- **Sweep it up.**

Sweep or blow any fertilizer from hard surfaces into the lawn, not into the street.

- **Mow properly.**

Proper mowing is important for a well-kept lawn. Newly-seeded lawns should be mowed early and often, leaving 1.5 to 2.0 inches of grass height. Once your lawn is established, set the mower blade at the highest setting, leaving 2 to 3.5 inches of grass. Tall grass encourages deep roots and shades out some weeds. If mowed too closely, root growth is slowed. This reduces the lawns tolerance to heat and drought. It is best not to remove more than 1/3 of the grass at one mowing. Keep your mower blade sharp.

- **Leave grass clippings on the lawn.**

After mowing, leave grass clippings on your lawn. As they break down, the grass clippings return nitrogen to the soil, satisfying your lawn's needs.

- **Skip the grass, add more plants.**


Has all this talk about fertilizer got your head spinning? Save yourself the headache by planting trees, shrubs and hardy perennials. Enhancing your yard with more plants and trees will slow down erosion and keep pollutants from stormwater runoff out of the storm drains.

Code Compliance Corner

Hello again to all Smithfield residents from your planning technician/ code enforcement official, Joseph Reish. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Smithfield residents for doing their part in keeping the Town looking great. For this newsletter, I offer a few suggestions to all the fine residents of Smithfield.

New Grass Height Violation Fines – Spring is here and summer is just around the corner, the perfect time to let everyone know about the new grass height violation fines. Town Council recently amended town code chapter 86-1 to include civil penalty fines for repeat offenders of the town grass height code. The amended section of town code 86-1 now reads as follows; “In the case of subsequent violations not arising from the same set of facts within twelve months of an initial violation, a civil penalty shall be imposed on the property owner, whether the subsequent violation is remedied by the owner or his agent, or the Town or their agent. The first subsequent violation within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$100.00; the second, a civil penalty of \$150.00; the third and all additional subsequent violations within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$200.00 each.” These fines are not steps that we wanted to take, but after an overwhelming number of grass height violations last year, a stronger Town grass height code was needed to be an incentive for residents and property owners to maintain their property. Please everyone; keep your grass mowed so these fines don’t have to be used, and a big thanks to everyone who works hard to keep their yards and properties looking good.

Signs – A few business owners seem to be unaware that the Town of Smithfield requires a sign permit before putting up or installing signs and advertising devices. Please be aware that most types of signs require a sign permit before they can be installed, and any advertising devices that flutter in the wind and cause distractions to motorists are prohibited. Please contact the Planning Department before installing any type of signage.

Historic District- If you reside in the beautiful historic district; please be aware that all historic district structures are protected under Town Ordinance, therefore allowing a building in the historic district to fall into a state of disrepair (trim falling off, badly peeling paint, etc...) is a violation of historic district ordinance. With the warm weather approaching, now is a good time to paint and perform other maintenance. Don’t forget to get Board of Historic and Architectural Review approval before altering the appearance of any historic district building. Exceptions not requiring B.H.A.R. approval include any maintenance or repair that does not change the original look of the structure (painting the building the same color). If you are not sure about any work that you intend to start, please contact the Planning Department.

Greater Hampton Roads Regional Crime Lines

The Greater Hampton Roads Regional Crime Lines is an area wide cooperative effort of Crime Line and Crime Solvers programs throughout Hampton Roads. Crime Line is a privately funded, volunteer administered program designed to support local law enforcement efforts. No government money is accepted. By empowering citizens to call and leave anonymous tips, Crime Line is helping to make Hampton Roads a safer community. **IT WORKS:** Since 1982, Crime Line and Crime Solvers in Hampton Roads have closed the book on more than 16,000 cases and assisted in the recovery of more than \$27 million in stolen property and illegal drugs, with an approximate 97% conviction rate. **IT PAYS:** Callers to Crime Line could receive a reward of up to \$1,000 if their tip leads to an arrest. How secure is your business or home from petty crime?

The Smithfield Police Department has state certified Crime Prevention Specialists who will visit your establishment or residence and assess how secure you, your staff and your inventory, or your residence are against theft, at no cost. An assessment is as easy as contacting the Police Department at 357-3247, and we can schedule you an appointment with a Crime Prevention Specialist.

What you should know BEFORE contracting with a locksmith

Any business that sells, installs, or services locks must be licensed by the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS). The contract for locksmith services must contain the DCJS business license number. This number will begin with "11" followed by a four digit number (example: 11-5432). You can verify the business has a valid license number by visiting the DCJS website at <http://www.dcjs.virginia.gov/pss/special/locksmith.cfm> or calling the Division of Regulatory Affairs at 804-786-4700. Any individual that sells, installs, or services locks must be registered by DCJS. The locksmith that responds to a call for service must present credentials issued by DCJS (photo ID or letter of registration) upon your request. If they cannot produce valid DCJS credentials, it is recommended that you do not do business with them. You can verify an individual has a valid registration number by visiting their website at <http://www.dcjs.virginia.gov/pss/special/locksmith.cfm> or calling the Division of Regulatory Affairs at 804-786-4700. If you would like to file a formal complaint with the Department of Criminal Justice Services against a locksmith business or individual, please fill out a complaint form and attach all related documents/contracts/correspondence that supports your complaint. Foreign lottery and inheritance fraud facts

Congratulations! You just inherited, or won, \$5 million!! Sound too good to be true? It is - scammers are working hard to separate people from their money year round. Many victims are older, live alone, and may suffer from some cognitive impairment. Criminals can use Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) to "spoof" caller ID, making a call appear to come from anywhere in the world, the United States, or even from a government agency. In addition to phone calls, victims often receive notification and instructions through e-mail. Victims sometimes bond with the criminals who are preying on them. Criminals take an active interest in their lives, and often spend hours on the phone talking to victims. This relationship can cause victims to continue to send money even after they've been advised that they're being scammed. They may even take steps to hide these payments and resist efforts to break off contact with the criminals. People who enjoy entering sweepstakes, lotteries, and games of chance may be at a higher risk for becoming victims. Criminals may purchase legitimate mailing lists to find victims. Learn the facts about foreign lottery fraud and inheritance scams and pass them on. The fact is that no legitimate lottery or inheritance requires you to pay fees or taxes upfront to collect winnings. If you or a loved one falls victim to a foreign lottery or inheritance scam, contact the Smithfield Police Department and file a report. If you would like more information on protecting yourself and others from scams and fraud you can visit the Smithfield Police Department website at www.smithfieldpolice.com. Just remember your best defense against scammers is often common sense - if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
