America/Smithfield in Bloom

The Town of Smithfield is proudly participating in the 2012 America in Bloom program. America in Bloom is a national awards program for towns and cities of all sizes that provides a framework for improving the overall quality of life. It is the only program of its kind that provides on-site, one on one mentoring and coaching by a team of expert judges. In our case the judges will be visiting here in Smithfield on June 21st and 22nd.

The categories of judging include: Floral Displays – attracting attention with colorful plants; Landscaped Areas – designed tree, shrub, turf and perennial plantings; Urban Forestry; Environmental Effort – sustainable development and awareness; Heritage – preserving your past for future generations; and Overall Impression. For each category the judges will look for involvement from the town government, local businesses, residents and the overall community.

We need to show off the community as a whole not simply public places here in town. Thus we encourage residents to spruce up their yards and businesses to add an extra flower to the window box, add a touch of paint to the door or volunteer for an upcoming improvement project. We really want the town to look its best by mid-June!

A local committee has been formed and it is chaired by local architect Russell Parrish. We thank last year's Chamber of Commerce Leadership Isle of Wight class for researching and promoting this project to the town. Planning Department

Code Compliance Corner Spring 2012

Hello again to all Smithfield residents from your planning technician/ code compliance officer, Joseph Reish. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Smithfield residents for doing their part in keeping the Town looking great. Smithfield is truly a unique place with so much charm and beauty. For this newsletter, I offer a few suggestions to all the fine residents of Smithfield.

Grass Height- Spring is here, warmer weather and longer days; it will soon be time to mow the lawn. Please keep in mind that unmaintained yards may be in violation of Town code if the height of the grass is allowed to become exceedingly tall. Not only does a well maintained yard keep your home looking good, it helps keep the Town looking good.

Permits- Just about any structure being built in the Town requires a zoning permit or a permit waiver. Fences and sheds of any size require a zoning permit, as do swimming pools, additions, decks, ect... Please be aware that a zoning permit is not the same as a building permit. Zoning permits can be obtained at Town Hall, 310 Institute Street, right here in Smithfield. There is a \$25.00 fee for processing the zoning permit application, but that small fee can help you avoid a major headache if something is built without a proper permit.

Historic District- If you reside in the beautiful historic district; please be aware that older houses and sheds often require more maintenance than most modern buildings. All historic district structures are protected under Town Ordinance, therefore allowing a building in the historic district to fall into a state of disrepair (trim falling off, badly peeling paint, etc...) is a violation of historic district ordinance. With the warm weather approaching, now is a good time to paint and perform other maintenance. Don't forget to get Board of Historic and Architectural Review approval before altering the appearance of any historic district building. Exceptions not requiring B.H.A.R. approval include any maintenance or repair that does not change the original look of the structure (painting the building the same color). If you are not sure about any work that you intend to start, please contact the planning department.



WATER CONSERVATION



Outdoor Saving Tips

- Adjust your schedule to the season: Summer Bermuda grass can be watered every 3rd day and winter lawn every 5th day.
- Outfit all hose with automatic shut-off (pistol-style) nozzles.
- Use sprinklers on turf, but use drip irrigation or soaker hoses on flowers, shrubs, gardens and trees.
- Position sprinklers so they're not watering the driveways and sidewalks.
- Adjust your lawnmower to cut grass to a height of 3 inches or more. Taller grass encourages deeper roots and shade the soil to reduce moisture loss.



Outdoors

It may surprise you to learn that up to 70% of household water is used outdoors. Studies show that homeowners use 2 to 5 times more water than is really needed in their landscapes. Most landscape watering can be cut in half with no visible effects on the plants. Even if you have installed low water use plants, it is up to you to continually monitor the amount of water they receive. Saving water outdoors, then, can really make a difference.

Indoors

Indoors, homeowners can reduce water use by about 30% by installing more efficient water fixtures and regularly checking for leaks. Fixing toilet leaks and dripping faucets can save more than 600 gallons a month.

Indoor Saving Tips

- Install a low-flow showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install and can save your family more than 500 gallons a week.
- Use recycled water on plants. Sources—water left from boiled eggs, tea kettles, washed vegetables.
- Replace your old toilet, the largest water user inside your home. Use food coloring to check for "silent leaks".
- When doing laundry, match the water level to the size of the load.
- Time your shower to keep it under 5 minutes. You'll save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Check your indoor water using appliances and devices for leaks.



Pools, Fountains & Spas

- Make sure your swimming pools, fountains and ponds are equipped with re-circulating pumps.
- Use a grease pencil to mark the water level of your pool at the skimmer. Check the mark 24 hours later. Your pool should lose no more than 1/8 inch each day.
- Just how serious can a leak become? A pinhole-sized leak in a pool plumbing system with 40lbs of pressure will lose approximately 970 gallons of water in a 24-hour period. This comes to about 30,000 gallons a month or 360,000 gallons per year. That's enough to drain and refill the average residential swimming pool more than a dozen times.

Rain Barrels

Rain barrels conserve water that would have otherwise been running off into the gutter, and are especially beneficial to areas that suffer from heavy droughts during the warmer months. By using water from a rain barrel to water plants, a homeowner can see substantial savings on his utility bills. The homeowner can water his lawn and garden even if water use has been restricted in his area, as the water comes from a storage source and not water lines.

Moody's/AVES will provide free pick up service for your old furniture, appliances, TV's, stereos, carpets and lawn maintenance equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, etc. (equipment must be free of oil and gas) for Town residents on the following Saturdays:

Date of Service and Area of Town

Saturday, April 21:

All areas north and west of Cypress Creek and the Pagan River (including River Oaks, Pinewood Heights, Goose Hill Creek, Jericho Estates, Cypress Creek, Riverview, Lakeside, Downtown areas, Jersey Park, West Main Street, etc.)

Saturday, April 28:

All areas on the south side of town including both sides of South Church Street and east of Cypress Creek (including Waterford Oaks, Willow Oaks, Aspen Woods, Scots Landing, Pinehurst, Grimesland, etc.)

Saturday, May 5:

All areas east and north of South Church Street and both sides of Battery Park Road (includes Rising Star, Wellington Estates, Moone Plantation, Smithfield Forest, John Rolfe Estates, Croatan Landing, Moonefield, Pagan Point, Red Point Heights, Deer Run, etc.)

Everything to be picked up must be at the street side **no later than 6:30 AM**. The trucks will not be able to drive into your yard to pick up heavy items. *Please call Moody's/AVES at 357-9997 with any questions about Spring Clean Up Days.*

****PLEASE NOTE: Moody's/AVES WILL NOT PICK UP YARD DEBRIS OR TREE LIMBS (larger than 3" in diameter or longer than 4 feet) OR STRUCTURAL DEBRIS SUCH AS USED LUMBER, ROOFING, SIDING, ETC. Leaves or other yard trimmings must be bagged. Limbs must be tied and bundled.**

OTHER ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: TIRES, COMPUTERS, PAINTS, BATTERIES, GAS CYLINDERS, OIL, ASBESTOS, ANIMAL CARCASSES AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.

NOTE: If you have household hazardous waste you can dispose of it free of charge at the Isle of Wight Transfer Station, 13191 Foursquare Road, Smithfield on the fourth Saturday of the months of January, April, July and October, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. You may recycle used motor oil at this location. They also take paint, pesticides, antifreeze, fuels, hobby supplies, insecticides, herbicides, paint thinners, solvents, fertilizers, swimming pool chemicals, household batteries and cleaners. You may reach the IOW Transfer Station at 961-3874.

Smithfield Police Department Swears in New Chief

Chief Steven G. Bowman was sworn in as Chief of the Smithfield Police Department on March 15th, 2012. Chief Bowman has spent most of his career in law enforcement, having served with the Surry County Sheriff's Office, the Smithfield Police Department, the Virginia State Police, and the Virginia Marine Resource Commission. He was the Chief Deputy Sheriff for the Isle of Wight County Sheriff's Office just before he joined the Virginia Marine Resources Commission in 1992 as Deputy Chief of Law Enforcement. He was promoted to Chief of Law Enforcement in 1996, promoted in 2004 to Deputy Commissioner, and then in 2006 was promoted to Commissioner. He was a dean's list graduate of the University of Louisville (Kentucky), Southern Police Institute, Administrative Officer's Class in 1995. In 2000, he attended the Virginia Executive Institute. Chief Bowman received a Bachelor Degree in Governmental Administration from Christopher Newport University. He received Departmental Honors for Exceptional Academic Achievement, and was elected to "Who's Who" among students in American universities and colleges. Chief Bowman and his wife Amy reside in Smithfield. He has two sons, Steven and Conner.

Accreditation

The Smithfield Police Department earned its initial Certificate of Accreditation on March 23rd, 2000. The agency in charge of accreditation is the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission (VLEPSC). Commission standards require a re-evaluation every four years, and the Smithfield Police Department recently completed their third Re-Accreditation. The VLEPSC is comprised of the Virginia Sheriffs' Association, the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police and the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services. The Commission's goals include increasing the effectiveness and efficiency of law enforcement agencies in the Commonwealth through the delivery of services; promoting cooperation among all components in the criminal justice system; ensuring the appropriate level of training for law enforcement personnel; and promoting public confidence in law enforcement. An agency must show proof of compliance with 187 standards that the Commission establishes. The standards are divided into four categories: administration, operations, personnel, and training.
