During a recent ride around Town, I could not help but notice the increasing number of homes that had a golf cart in the driveway. It made me realize that it was time to talk about ways to keep everyone safe while enjoying the use of your golf cart in the neighborhood.

Section 78 of the Town Code governs the use of golf carts in Smithfield. Golf carts can operate on Town streets with speed limits of 25mph or less, they must be insured, and must only be operated by individuals that possess a valid driver's license. Golf carts are allowed to be driven between sunrise and sunset and must have a Town issued vehicle license.



## BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWALS

Please note that all 2021 Business License Applications are due by April 15, 2021. A 10% penalty will be added to those purchased after the due date with interest added at the rate of 10% per annum as of May 1. A copy of each applicant's Schedule C is required as backup for reported gross receipts. New businesses may contact the Treasurer's office at 365-4276 throughout the year to purchase a business license. The first year's license may be based on estimated gross receipts.

## TOWN OF SMITHFIELD COVID-19 UTILITY RELIEF PROGRAM



On November 18, 2020, Governor Northam signed a budget amendment for the Commonwealth of Virginia that allocated \$100 million of federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funds towards relief for utility customers whose accounts are in arrears. The Town of Smithfield was approved for a portion of this funding to assist its residents and business owners that qualify.

Eligibility requirements are as follows:

Applicants must have an active Town of Smithfield water and/or sewer account.

Applicants must have a past due balance on their account for consumption beginning March 1, 2020. Commencing March 1, 2020, applicants experienced economic hardship resulting from loss of income due to COVID-19. Additional requirements and details may be found on the application form that has been posted on the Town website ([www.smithfieldva.gov](http://www.smithfieldva.gov)).

Available funding will be applied to eligible accounts in the order received during the authorized relief period.

### PUPS IN THE PARK



At this time, we anticipate that the application will appear as a public hearing item on the Tuesday, May 11th, 2021 Planning Commission meeting agenda.

Smithfield Town Council would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our Town staff and the citizens of Smithfield for their patience and understanding during the last year. Everyone please continue to work together in keeping your property looking good as our Town has a wonderful reputation of being not only friendly but "clean." Thanks for your support.






# Code Compliance Corner

Spring 2021

Hello again to all Smithfield residents from your Planning Technician/ Code Enforcement Official, Joseph Reish. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Smithfield residents for doing their part in keeping the Town looking great. For this newsletter, I offer a few suggestions to all the residents of Smithfield.

**Building Numbers-** Some of the houses in Smithfield may not have visible street/ building numbers. Every building in Town is required to have building numbers that are attached to the house and are visible from the road. Not having building numbers makes it harder for emergency services to locate you in the event of an emergency and is also a violation of Town Code.

**Grass Height Violation Fines** – Spring is here, and summer is just around the corner, which makes this the perfect time to let everyone know about the grass height violation fines. Town code chapter 86-1 now includes civil penalty fines for repeat offenders of the town grass height code. The amended section of town code 86-1 now reads as follows; “In the case of subsequent violations not arising from the same set of facts within twelve months of an initial violation, a civil penalty shall be imposed on the property owner, whether the subsequent violation is remedied by the owner or his agent, or the Town or their agent. The first subsequent violation within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$100.00; the second, a civil penalty of \$150.00; the third and all additional subsequent violations within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$200.00 each.” Please keep your grass mowed so these fines don’t have to be used, and a big thanks to everyone who works hard to keep their yards and properties looking good.

**Historic District-** With the warm weather approaching, now is a good time to paint and perform other maintenance activities in the beautiful historic district; however, don’t forget to get Board of Historic and Architectural Review (BHAR) approval before altering the appearance and/or changing building materials or the colors of any historic district building. Exterior work that is exempt from BHAR review and approval includes maintenance or repair that does not alter the original appearance and color, and maintains the original type of materials of the structure; such as painting the building the same color, or replacing damaged siding with siding of a like material. Please contact Tammie Clary, Town Planner ([tclary@smithfieldva.gov](mailto:tclary@smithfieldva.gov)) to obtain a zoning permit waiver for all exempt maintenance and repair work. ## FOG CLOGS

Never pour fats, oils or grease down the drain.



FOG is any material, either liquid or solid, composed of fats, oils, or grease from an animal or vegetable source.

FOG builds up on pipe walls and blocks flow, causing wastewater to back up and flow out of manholes, or even back into homes and businesses. When this happens, it is called a Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO). It requires costly cleanup which can result in increased sewer rates and may be hazardous to human health or to the environment.

### Here is how YOU can help:

Use strainers in your sink drains to catch food scraps and other solids; empty strainer contents into the trash.

“Dry Wipe” all pots, pans, and plates contents into the trash prior to washing. This helps prevent the buildup of grease in your sewer lines and the town’s sewer lines. Therefore, preventing backup into your home caused by clogged pipes.

When cooking with oil (i.e. frying) in addition to dry wiping; if oil is still hot, pour contents into heat safe container and allow to cool. Once cooled and solidified, dispose of the FOG safely by placing into the trash.


# Backflow Prevention-What does it mean to you?

**Backflow** is the reversal flow of fluids, chemicals, or any foreign material into the potable water supply. There are two forms of Backflow that can happen. **Backsiphonage** happens when there is a partial vacuum in the potable water supply, which draws water from a contaminated source back into the potable water supply and **Backpressure** can happen when there is resistance or force opposing the desired flow of fluid through the pipes. However, when drinking water is contaminated; if consumed, this causes concern for the public health .



## How can you help?

**Do you own a hose?** Installing an inexpensive frost proof hose bib can help! The hose bib has a spring in the compact assembly which allows water pressure to enter one way only! If the water supply pressure drops, the spring closes and a valve will open which will discharge the contaminated water before it enters the potable water supply! These are non-testable devices, if the assembly is “spitting” water, it is doing what it should!



## Sprinklers or an Irrigation system?

You **SHOULD** already have your backflow prevention device installed. It is called a Pressure Vacuum Breaker (PVB) as pictured to the left. The pipes underground are cross connected with the potable water supply. The PVB constantly measures the systems pressure, when the pressure suddenly drops in the water system, a check valve closes to prevent the backflow of the water through the device, which keeps the water from entering your home or the towns' water supply. These are testable devices and are required by law to be tested annually by an approved certified backflow prevention device tester and the passing test report should then be submitted to the Compliance Administrator at Town Hall located at 310 Institute Street in Smithfield.



## **Do you have Sprinklers or an Irrigation System?**

### **Here is what to expect for 2021:**

-If you have already received a letter for the inspection request of your Backflow Prevention Device, please be aware that your inspection report deadline is approaching! Have your inspection report in by July 5, 2021 to avoid further notices.

-If you have not received your Backflow Prevention Device Inspection request, they will be sent out in July with the deadline of November 1, 2021.

# **NOTICE TO ALL TOWN RESIDENTS**

## **2021 SPRING COMMUNITY CLEANUP DAYS**

Bay Disposal and Recycling will provide free pick up service for your old furniture, appliances, TV's, stereos, carpets and lawn maintenance equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, etc. (equipment must be free of oil and gas) for Town residents on the following Saturdays:

### **Date of Service and Area of Town**

---

#### **Saturday, April 24:**

All areas north and west of Cypress Creek and the Pagan River (including River Oaks, Pinewood Heights, Goose Hill Creek, Jericho Estates, Cypress Creek, Riverview, Lakeside, Historical District, Jersey Park, West Main Street, etc.)

---

#### **Saturday, May 1:**

All areas on the south side of town including both sides of South Church Street and east of Cypress Creek (including Waterford Oaks, Willow Oaks, Aspen Woods, Scots Landing, Pinehurst, Smithfield Manor, Grimesland, etc.)

---

#### **Saturday, May 8:**

All areas east and north of South Church Street and both sides of Battery Park Road (includes Rising Star, Wellington Estates, Moone Plantation, Smithfield Forest, John Rolfe Estates, Croatan Landing, Moonefield, Pagan Point, Red Point Heights, Deer Run, Villas, Church Square, Lakeview Cove etc.)

---

Everything to be picked up must be at the street side no later than 6:30 AM. The trucks will not be able to drive into your yard to pick up any items. *Please call Bay Disposal and Recycling at 857-9700 with any questions about Spring Clean Up Days.*

***\*\*PLEASE NOTE: BAY DISPOSAL AND RECYCLING WILL NOT PICK UP YARD DEBRIS OR TREE LIMBS (larger than 3" in diameter or longer than 4 feet) OR STRUCTURAL DEBRIS SUCH AS USED LUMBER, ROOFING, SIDING, ETC. Leaves or other yard trimmings must be placed in bags. Limbs must be tied and bundled.***

***OTHER ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: TIRES, COMPUTERS, PAINTS, BATTERIES, GAS CYLINDERS, OIL, ASBESTOS, ANIMAL CARCASSES AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.***

**NOTE:** The Isle of Wight Transfer Station, 13191 Foursquare Road, Smithfield no longer takes any hazardous materials. They will recycle used motor oil at this location. Hours of operation are Monday - Friday from 8am to 3pm and Saturday from 8am to 12pm. You may reach the IOW Transfer Station at 961-3874.

The Suffolk Transfer Station on #1 Bob Foeller Drive, Suffolk will take hazardous materials. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday from 8am to 4pm and Saturday from 8am to 12pm. You may reach the Suffolk Transfer Station at 961-3683. You will be asked to provide an ID or utility bill as proof of residency.

# The Smithfield Thin Blue Line

Please join us in congratulating Eric Phillips on his recent promotion. He began his career with the Smithfield Police Department in 2011 as a Patrolman, then was promoted to Patrol Sergeant, and now he serves as the Patrol Lieutenant.

### Phone Down It's the Law!

Effective January 1, 2021, it is illegal to hold a handheld personal communications device (e.g., your smartphone) while driving a moving motor vehicle on Virginia highways. This new law is one of many ways the Commonwealth is buckling down on distracted driving.

What's Off-Limits? While driving, it will be illegal to hold a mobile device in your hand while doing some activities, such as: Dial a phone number, send a text message, update/browse social media, video conference, shop online, watch movies, check the weather, play games, and more.

What Happens If I'm Pulled Over? In the event that you are pulled over for holding a handheld personal communications device, act in the same manner you would for any traffic stop. You will NOT be asked to hand the device over to the officer. Keep in mind that WHAT you are doing with the device is irrelevant, it is the act of HOLDING the device while driving that is illegal.

Breaking The Law Will Cost You! A person who violates 46.2-818.2 is subject to a fine of \$125 for the first offense and \$250 for the second and subsequent offenses. A person who is convicted of reckless driving who was also in violation of 46.2-818.2 when committing the offense can be fined up to \$2,500, up to 12 months in jail, and up to a six month license suspension, but shall be fined a mandatory minimum fine of \$250. A person who violates this law while driving in a highway work zone shall be fined \$250.

The Five Exceptions: 1) The operator of any emergency vehicle while he/she is engaged in the performance of his/her official duties. 2) An operator who is lawfully parked or stopped. 3) Any person using a handheld personal communications device in order to report an emergency. 4) The use of an amateur or a citizens band radio. 5) The operator of any Department of Transportation vehicle during the performance of traffic incident management services. If you want to read the code in its entirety, check out VA State Code, 46.2-818.2. (Effective January 1, 2021) Use of handheld personal communications devices in certain motor vehicles; exceptions; penalty.

### COVID Scams

The following guidance comes from the FBI, the Federal Trade Commission, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the Better Business Bureau. **SCAM:** You are asked to pay for your vaccine. You won't have to pay to receive the Covid vaccine when it's your turn. You should only receive the vaccine at authorized vaccination sites such as hospitals, pharmacies or mass vaccination hubs such as sports arenas. **SCAM:** If you receive an offer to get your Covid vaccine early for a fee, ignore it. No health department or vaccination site would vaccinate someone ahead of schedule if they paid for it. **SCAM:** You are told to pay to put your name on a waiting list. Your local health department or vaccination site will not reach out to you and ask for payment to be put on a waiting list. **SCAM:** You are asked to schedule appointments through unverified platforms. You should avoid registering through sites unaffiliated with your health department or pharmacy. **SCAM:** You are told to pay to have the vaccine shipped to you. Vaccine distributors are not shipping doses of the vaccine to individuals, and you should not administer the vaccine to yourself. **SCAM:** You are made to take additional tests before you get a vaccine. You do not need to take an antibody test or Covid test before you receive a vaccine.

**How to avoid getting scammed.** Staying informed is the best way to prevent scammers from accessing your money or private information. It is best to reach out to your health care provider directly to get the facts, rather than solely interact with an unknown person through email or text. If an unknown source asks for your Social Security number, bank account information or insurance ID, do not give it to them unless you have verified their identity with an official source, such as your health department or health care provider. There are a few places where you can report vaccine scams: The Federal Trade Commission's ReportFraud.ftc.gov, which shares information with law enforcement.


### JDLR - Just Doesn't Look Right:


