





BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWALS



Please note that all 2014 Business License Applications are due by April 15, 2014. A 10% penalty will be added to those purchased after the due date, and interest at the rate of 10% per annum will be added as of May 1. A copy of the applicant's Schedule C is required as backup for reported gross receipts. New businesses may contact the Treasurer's office at 365-4276 any time during the year for purchase of a business license. The first year's license may be based on estimated

UTILITY DEPOSITS



The Town of Smithfield has amended its utility ordinance to include a deposit for all new accounts and delinquent accounts subject to disconnection. Residential customer deposits are \$175 and must be paid directly to the Town of Smithfield, not HRUBS. Payments made to HRUBS should only include utility charges outstanding. The Treasurer's office is open from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday through Friday to assist customers with service applications and bill payment. Please call 365-4254 to contact the utility clerk.

Code Compliance Corner Spring 2014

Hello again to all Smithfield residents from your planning technician/ code enforcement official, Joseph Reish. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Smithfield residents for doing their part in keeping the Town looking great. For this newsletter, I offer a few suggestions to all the fine residents of Smithfield.

New Grass Height Violation Fines – Spring is here and summer is just around the corner, the perfect time to let everyone know about the grass height violation fines. Town Council amended town code chapter 86-1 to include civil penalty fines for repeat offenders of the town grass height code. The amended section of town code 86-1 now reads as follows; “In the case of subsequent violations not arising from the same set of facts within twelve months of an initial violation, a civil penalty shall be imposed on the property owner, whether the subsequent violation is remedied by the owner or his agent, or the Town or their agent. The first subsequent violation within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$100.00; the second, a civil penalty of \$150.00; the third and all additional subsequent violations within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$200.00 each.” These fines are not steps that we wanted to take, but after an overwhelming number of grass height violations, a stronger Town grass height code was needed to be an incentive for residents and property owners to maintain their property. Please everyone; keep your grass mowed so these fines don’t have to be used, and a big thanks to everyone who works hard to keep their yards and properties looking good.



Stormwater Regulations and Zoning Permits- Just about any structure being built in the Town requires a zoning permit or a permit waiver and large structures also require building permits from Isle of Wight County. Fences and sheds of any size require a zoning permit, as do swimming pools, additions, decks, etc... Please be aware that a Town zoning permit is not the same as an Isle of Wight County building permit. Zoning permits can be obtained at Town Hall, 310 Institute Street, right here in Smithfield. There is a \$25.00 fee for processing the zoning permit application, but that small fee can help you avoid a major headache if something is built without a proper permit. The Commonwealth of Virginia requires The Town of Smithfield to review stormwater management practices when issuing zoning permits. One factor to be aware of when applying for a zoning permit is how much of your property is covered with structures such as the house, driveway, pool, etc. Structures that do not allow rainwater to reach the ground are known as impervious surfaces. The state mandates that individual properties have no more than 16% of impervious surface without doing on-site stormwater management. There are many properties in a town as old as Smithfield that have more than 16% of impervious surface, and these are ok to stay as they are, but please be aware that stormwater management and total impervious surface area are factors that will need to be addressed when applying for a zoning permit. Please do not purchase a shed or pool or sign a contract for construction of an addition or detached garage without checking with the Planning Department first to determine the impact.

TOWN CODE— ANIMALS Section 18-45 Chaining and Enclosures

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person owning and/or controlling dogs whether vaccinated or unvaccinated, licensed or unlicensed, to allow said animal to be tied or chained to dog houses, or other stationary objects for a period of time longer than 8 hours in a 24-hour period and shall be prohibited from 11:00 p.m. through 6:00 a.m.

Moody's/AVES will provide free pick up service for your old furniture, appliances, TV's, stereos, carpets and lawn maintenance equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, etc. (equipment must be free of oil and gas) for Town residents on the following Saturdays:

Date of Service and Area of Town

Saturday, April 19:

All areas north and west of Cypress Creek and the Pagan River (including River Oaks, Pinewood Heights, Goose Hill Creek, Jericho Estates, Cypress Creek, Riverview, Lakeside, Downtown areas, Jersey Park, West Main Street, etc.)

Saturday, April 26:

All areas on the south side of town including both sides of South Church Street and east of Cypress Creek (including Waterford Oaks, Willow Oaks, Aspen Woods, Scots Landing, Pinehurst, Grimesland, etc.)

Saturday, May 4:

All areas east and north of South Church Street and both sides of Battery Park Road (includes Rising Star, Wellington Estates, Moone Plantation, Smithfield Forest, John Rolfe Estates, Croatan Landing, Moonefield, Pagan Point, Red Point Heights, Deer Run, Villas, etc.)

Everything to be picked up must be at the street side **no later than 6:30 AM**. The trucks will not be able to drive into your yard to pick up any items. *Please call Moody's/AVES at 357-9997 with any questions about Spring Clean Up Days.*

*****PLEASE NOTE: Moody's/AVES WILL NOT PICK UP YARD DEBRIS OR TREE LIMBS (larger than 3" in diameter or longer than 4 feet) OR STRUCTURAL DEBRIS SUCH AS USED LUMBER, ROOFING, SIDING, ETC. Leaves or other yard trimmings must be bagged. Limbs must be tied and bundled.***

OTHER ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: TIRES, COMPUTERS, PAINTS, BATTERIES, GAS CYLINDERS, OIL, ASBESTOS, ANIMAL CARCASSES AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.



NOTE: If you have household hazardous waste you can dispose of it free of charge at the Isle of Wight Transfer Station, 13191 Foursquare Road, Smithfield on the fourth Saturday of the months of January, April, July and October, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. You may recycle used motor oil at this location. They also take paint, pesticides, antifreeze, fuels, hobby supplies, insecticides, herbicides, paint thinners, solvents, fertilizers, swimming pool chemicals, household batteries and cleaners. You may reach the IOW Transfer Station at 961-3874.

Just a reminder that plastic bag litter has negative impacts on the agricultural community, economic activity and the aesthetic appeal of our community and they cannot be placed into the town's single stream recycling containers.

Plastic bags may be recycled at all Isle of Wight County Convenience Centers and at Farm Fresh and Food Lion in Smithfield.

Bags need to be clean, dry and have any hard plastic or string removed from them. The types of plastic bags that can be recycled are grocery bags, retail bags, dry cleaning bags, newspaper bags, and any clean dry bag labeled #2 or #4. Plastic wrap from paper towels and toilet paper can also be recycled.

The town receives a Litter Prevention and Recycling Grant each year from DEQ to help educate and promote our program. Please stop by and visit our recycling booth during

Olden Days on Saturday, June 28th 2014. We will be giving away reusable totes, litter bags, activity books and other educational materials as well as bottle bird feeders (by popular demand).

- Paper (all colors - please remove rubber bands and plastic wrap.)
- Milk and Juice Cartons (no wax)
- Plastic bottles (marked #1 or #2)
- Soda, Juice, and Water Bottles (glass or plastic)
- Food Containers (marked #1 or #2)
- Glass Bottles and Jars (any color)
- Aluminum (pie plates, trays, foil, etc.)
- Metal Cans (tin, steel, aluminum)
- Milk Jugs, Bleach, Detergent, and Shampoo Bottles

Wednesday is Debris Pick-Up Day. Please call Moody's/AVES at 357-9997 by 3:00 p.m. the prior Friday to schedule a pick up. Leaves and yard waste must be placed in clear bags and tied and not exceed 35 pounds each. Branches must be tied and bundled and not exceed 3 inches in diameter and 60 inches in length. There is a limit of 10 bags and/or bundles per pickup.

Neighborhood Watch

Neighborhood Watch is a crime prevention program that stresses education and common sense. It teaches citizens how to help themselves by identifying and reporting suspicious activity in their neighborhoods. It also provides citizens with the opportunity to make their neighborhoods safer and improve the quality of life. Neighborhood Watch groups typically focus on observation and awareness as a means of preventing crime and employ strategies that range from simply promoting social interaction and "watching out for each other" to active patrols by groups of citizens. Most neighborhood crime prevention groups are organized around a block or a neighborhood and are started with assistance from a law enforcement agency. Volunteers who donate their time and resources are typically at the center of such programs, since many do not have a formal budget or source of funding. Most programs use street signs to show the presence of the program to deter any would-be criminals. All Neighborhood Watches share one foundational idea - bringing community members together to reestablish control of their neighborhoods and promote an increased quality of life and reduction in the crime rate for that area. The reason for this effectiveness is rather simple, involving community members in watch programs decreases opportunities for criminals to commit crime, rather than attempting to change their behavior or motivation. Identity Theft

Identity theft tops the list of consumer complaints for the 14th consecutive year! The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) recently announced its top 10 consumer complaints for 2013. Of the more than two million consumer complaints received, . Identity Theft leads the field with 14 percent of total complaints filed. Thirty percent of those were tax- or wage-related, which continues to be the largest category within identity theft complaints. Coming in at a close second: Debt collection, with 10 percent. Third was: Banks and lenders, with seven percent. Rounding out the field: Imposter scams; telephone and mobile services; prizes, sweepstakes, and lotteries; auto related complaints; shop-at-home and catalog sales; television and electronic media; and advance payment for credit services. The good news is millions of consumers are beating the scammers. That's because complaints do matter and are being reported in record numbers to the FTC. If a business doesn't deliver on its promises, if someone cheats you out of your money, or if you've spotted a scam, please report it to the Smithfield Police Department and the FTC. Your complaints have helped the law enforcement put a stop on rip-off artists, scammers, and fraudsters. Additionally, the Smithfield Police Department and the FTC have consumer education campaigns to help empower people just like you to make well-informed buying decisions and recognize frauds and scams. National Night Out



On December 2, 2013, The National Association of Town Watch congratulated the Smithfield Police Department as a "National Award Winner for its outstanding participation in the 30th Anniversary National Night Out Crime, Drug, and Violence Prevention Program". On February 4, 2014, Chief Bowman presented the special award to the Town Council and acknowledged the outstanding efforts put forth by the Department's Police Officers, the Smithfield Community Crime Prevention Team, and the Smithfield YMCA for a job well done. This year's NNO involved 37.8 million people in 16,124 communities from all 50 states.

What is a Ponzi Scheme? A fraudulent investment operation where the operator pays returns to investors from new capital paid to the operators by new investors, rather than from profit earned by the operator. The perpetuation requires an ever-increasing flow of money from new investors. The scheme is named after Charles Ponzi, who became notorious for using the technique in 1920.
