ACCREDITED AGENCY

Our Public Works Department has recently been awarded the prestigious American Public Works Association (APWA) Accreditation. The APWA Accreditation program recognizes public works agencies that go beyond the requirements of the management practices established nationally in the public works industry and indicates the department has met applicable accreditation documentation and practices.

We began the self-assessment part of the accreditation process in January 2011. This assessment involved a thorough, department wide evaluation of current management and operation

olicies, practices and procedures. Each practice had to be formally documented and compared to the recommended practices contained in the APWA Best Management Practices Manual. This helped our department identify deficiencies that needed correction in order to develop a stronger organization and provide more effective public works services for the Town of Smithfield and our citizens.

Our Public Works Department is responsible for the maintenance and improvements of public roads and rights-of-way, water and sewer systems, as well as parks and recreation and public buildings. We are the smallest agency in Virginia and the second smallest in the United States and Canada to have achieved this honor. With a total of three administrative staff and sixteen field staff the accreditation process was not easy. It required significant staff time and resources to research and document every department policy and procedure. It was a team effort that many people helped to achieve, including both current and former staff as well as colleagues from other agencies.

Achieving this honor has instilled a sense of pride in our employees and allowed us to demonstrate the value of services we provide to the citizens of Smithfield. We are all very proud to be included as one of the APWA accredited agencies and to have had the honor to work with our late Director, William T. Hopkins, III to achieve this accomplishment. Our department will continue to strive to provide the best public works services possible.

BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWALS

Please note that all 2015 Business License Applications are due by April 15, 2015. A 10% penalty will be added to those purchased after the due date, and interest at the rate of 10% per annum will be added as of May 1. A copy of the applicant's Schedule C is required as backup for reported gross receipts. New businesses may contact the Treasurer's office at 365-4276 any time during the year for purchase of a business license. The first year's license may be based on estimated gross receipts.

Get alerted about emergencies and other important community news by signing up for Isle of Wight County's IWA-alert Emergency Notification System. This system enables us to provide you with critical information quickly in a variety of situations, such as severe weather, unexpected road closures, missing persons and evacuations of buildings or neighborhoods.

If you subscribed to the IWAAlert system in the past (prior to April 1, 2014), you will need to sign up for the new system by September 15, 2014 to continue to receive emergency notifications from IWAAlert and to take advantage of the new notification systems' enhanced features and. If you were not signed up under the old system, we encourage you to sign up and take advantage of the IWAAlert emergency notification system.

The IWAAlert system will allow you to:

- Choose the locations in Isle of Wight you want to be contacted about - your home, your parent's home, your workplace, your child's school or daycare, etc.
- Choose how you would like to be notified: by text message, email cell phone, home phone, work phone, etc. and the order in which you would like us to attempt to notify you.
- Sign up for various weather alerts directly from the National Weather Service and to control when you receive these weather alerts by setting up a quiet period.

In the new system, an account should be established for each person not by family. It takes just a few minutes to sign up, your information is confidential and you can make changes at any time.

Moody's/AVES will provide free pick up service for your old furniture, appliances, TV's, stereos, carpets and lawn maintenance equipment such as lawnmowers, weed-eaters, etc. (equipment must be free of oil and gas) for Town residents on the following Saturdays:

Date of Service and Area of Town

Saturday, April 18:

All areas north and west of Cypress Creek and the Pagan River (including River Oaks, Pinewood Heights, Goose Hill Creek, Jericho Estates, Cypress Creek, Riverview, Lakeside, Downtown areas, Jersey Park, West Main Street, etc.)

Saturday, April 25:

All areas on the south side of town including both sides of South Church Street and east of Cypress Creek (including Waterford Oaks, Willow Oaks, Aspen Woods, Scots Landing, Pinehurst, Grimesland, etc.)

Saturday, May 2:

All areas east and north of South Church Street and both sides of Battery Park Road (includes Rising Star, Wellington Estates, Moone Plantation, Smithfield Forest, John Rolfe Estates, Croatan Landing, Moonefield, Pagan Point, Red Point Heights, Deer Run, Villas, etc.)

Everything to be picked up must be at the street side **no later than 6:30 AM**. The trucks will not be able to drive into your yard to pick up any items. *Please call Moody's/AVES at 357-9997 with any questions about Spring Clean Up Days.*

****PLEASE NOTE: Moody's/AVES WILL NOT PICK UP YARD DEBRIS OR TREE LIMBS (larger than 3" in diameter or longer than 4 feet) OR STRUCTURAL DEBRIS SUCH AS USED LUMBER, ROOFING, SIDING, ETC. Leaves or other yard trimmings must be bagged. Limbs must be tied and bundled.**

OTHER ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP: TIRES, COMPUTERS, PAINTS, BATTERIES, GAS CYLINDERS, OIL, ASBESTOS, ANIMAL CARCASSES AND HAZARDOUS MATERIALS.

NOTE: The Isle of Wight Transfer Station, 13191 Foursquare Road, Smithfield no longer takes any hazardous materials. They will recycle used motor oil at this location. Hours of operation are Monday - Friday from 8am to 3pm and Saturday from 8am to 12pm. You may reach the IOW Transfer Station at 961-3874. The Suffolk Transfer Station on #1 Bob Foeller Drive, Suffolk will take hazardous materials. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday from 7am to 4pm and Saturday from 7am to 12pm. You may reach the Suffolk Transfer Station at 961-3683.

Code Compliance Corner

Spring 2015

Hello again to all Smithfield residents from your planning technician/ code enforcement official, Joseph Reish. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Smithfield residents for doing their part in keeping the Town looking great. For this newsletter, I offer a few suggestions to all the fine residents of Smithfield.

Grass Height Violation Fines – Spring is here and summer is just around the corner, the perfect time to let everyone know about the grass height violation fines. Town Code chapter 86-1 now includes civil penalty fines for repeat offenders of the town grass height code. The amended section of Town Code 86-1 now reads as follows; “In the case of subsequent violations not arising from the same set of facts within twelve months of an initial violation, a civil penalty shall be imposed on the property owner, whether the subsequent violation is remedied by the owner or his agent, or the Town or their agent. The first subsequent violation within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$100.00; the second, a civil penalty of \$150.00; the third and all additional subsequent violations within twelve months of the initial violation shall garner a civil penalty of \$200.00 each.” These fines are not steps that we wanted to take, but after an overwhelming number of grass height violations, a stronger Town grass height code was needed to be an incentive for residents and property owners to maintain their property. Please keep your grass mowed so these fines don’t have to be used, and a big thanks to everyone who works hard to keep their yards and properties looking good.

Building Numbers- Some of the houses in Smithfield may not have visible street/ building numbers. Every building in Town is required to have building numbers attached to the house that should be visible from the road. Not having building numbers not only makes it harder for emergency services to locate you in the event of an emergency, it is also a violation of Town Code.

Historic District- If you reside or own property in the beautiful historic district; please be aware that all historic district structures are protected under Town Ordinance; therefore allowing a building in the historic district to fall into a state of disrepair (trim falling off, badly peeling paint, holes in the roof, etc...) is a violation of historic district ordinance. With the warm weather approaching, now is a good time to paint and perform other maintenance. Don’t forget to get Board of Historic and Architectural Review approval before altering the appearance of any historic district building. Exceptions not requiring B.H.A.R. approval include maintenance or repair that does not alter the original look of the structure, such as painting the building the same color. If you are not sure about any work that you intend to start, please contact the Planning Department.

Chief Bowman Attends Hurricane Preparedness Training

Colonel Steven G. Bowman, Chief of Police, recently completed hurricane preparedness training at the National Hurricane Center located in Miami, Florida. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) selects four participants from hurricane prone states annually to receive training provided by meteorologists assigned to the National Hurricane Center.

The course, entitled "Hurricane Preparedness for Decision Makers" consisted of 36 hours of intense classroom training designed to prepare those in public safety positions to better understand and utilize the tools and forecast models provided by the National Weather Service in time of tropical storm emergency.

The course provided information on numerous topics commencing with general information on the formation of tropical cyclones and completed with a table-top exercise designed to test student's ability to utilize the information they had learned the previous week. Special emphasis was placed on utilizing models that predict storm surge and determining evacuation routes and timing. "The most important thing I learned while at the training", said Chief Bowman "was how dangerous storm surge can be in comparison to associated winds". Over 90 percent of deaths that occur from hurricanes are attributed to either storm surge or inland flooding. As one NHC meteorologist stated, "anyone can breathe in a one hundred mile per hour wind. But, no one can breathe in ten feet of water". Chief Bowman states that he looks forward to using the knowledge he gained while at the National Hurricane Center, but hopefully, no time soon. The course, with the exception of meals, was funded by FEMA.

Anthem Cyber Security Breach

About 80 million Anthem Inc. Health Insurance customers whose personal information may have been compromised in a recent cyber-attack could see their data used for thieves' financial gain. Information accessed includes names, dates of birth, member I.D. /social security numbers, addresses, phone numbers, email addresses and employment information. This is bad news as a social security number opens a host of ways thieves can steal a person's identity. There's no way customers could have protected themselves in this incident, but now that it's happened there are steps you can take to monitor and protect your identity. Six things all Anthem customers should do:

1. Visit AnthemFacts.com: The FAQ site is the best source of current information about the data breach.
2. Take advantage of free credit monitoring. All impacted members will receive notice via mail which will advise them of the protections being offered to them as well as any next steps. Take advantage of any protection or services Anthem is providing.
3. Use your free annual credit report: Federal law requires Equifax, Experian and TransUnion to give you a free credit report every 12 months if you ask for it. Set a reminder to visit AnnualCreditReport.com and request your free credit reports annually.
4. Place a security freeze on your credit access with all three credit bureaus: You must freeze your credit report at each credit bureau individually. Requests must be made in writing and include your name, address, date of birth, social security number, copy of a valid identification, proof of address (e.g. copy of utility bill) and payment. 5. Monitor your children: Children often don't actively use credit or apply for loans so they're less likely to discover fraudulent activity. A five-year-old child today will not likely realize their credit has been destroyed by fraudulent activity until it comes time for them to use it to apply for student loans in about 13 years. The Experian site contains lots of helpful explanations and information about how to manage and protect a minor's credit history. The challenge is nothing is available to monitor until or unless the child has a credit history, and according to Experian there are reasons that you would not want to preemptively establish and freeze a credit history in your child's name. In this case, you have everything to gain by placing a freeze on your children's credit history and checking it regularly to make sure no credit history has been created using your child's Social Security number.
6. Be alert as you file your income taxes: Armed with personal information like your name, address, and Social Security number, attackers could file a fraudulent income tax return in your name. The IRS and state tax authorities aren't really equipped to determine whether the person filing is legitimate. The variety of methods for receiving and cashing a tax refund make it possible for someone to file in your name and have the money spent before the fraud is discovered. At that point, you'll have to jump through some hoops to prove the initial return was fraudulent so you can file a valid tax return.
